Read the following extract carefully and answer ALL the questions that follow.

The following extract is from the novel 'Tsunami Girl' by Julian Sedgwick. A 15-year-old Yuki Hara Jones gets caught up in the March 2011 Great Eastern Japan Earthquake and Tsunami. In this extract Yuki tries to ride a wave to safety.

Spluttering, thrashing at the surface, blinking sea and salt out of her eyes, she sees a slab of debris floating right next to her. It's about the size of a garage door – and there's something crouched on it.

No time to think – she takes one big stroke with her good arm and grabs hold, trying to pull herself to safety, kicking hard with the sodden trainers on her feet. But it's impossible, the thing's bobbing up and down and slippery, and her strength is almost gone. Nothing to do but cling on as long as she can and hope somehow that they drift into the shallows eventually. She blinks at the thing on the 'raft' – and sees a small dog. A sodden little dog, steadying itself as it struggles to its feet, legs splayed, shaking...

Stuff under the water keeps banging into her legs and lower back, and her grip is already weakening. Now her head is above water and it's somehow almost worse than the moment when she thought all hope was gone. This tiny chance of survival is almost like she is being teased. She can taste the salt and mud in her mouth, the back of her nose. Again she tries to propel herself up out of the water's grip, her fingers desperately clawing the shiny wet surface.

No good. She slips and nearly goes right under again, her finger tips just keeping contact, the cold shocking her again. But then there's a sudden upthrust of the water, and it lifts her, and she is virtually catapulted out of the tsunami and onto the piece of flotsam where she lands in a mess of arms and legs, half-dead, choking up sea water and sludge.

For a moment she lies there clinging to the slippery surface as best as she can as the wrecking pitches up and down. She takes a deep breath, then steadies herself on all fours and wretches again and again from the pit of her stomach, coughing up muck that stings the back of her throat. As it eases – through the blur of water clinging to her eyes – she sees the bedraggled animal edging away to the far side of their makeshift raft. It yaps sharply. Maybe by some miracle it's Mrs Takeda's pouchi? About the right size, and the same reddish brown colouring. She holds out a hand, overwhelmingly glad to see something else living.

'Pouci?' It's OK, daijobu!' (it's ok) she coughs, and the animal suddenly whimpers and comes closer, paws skittering on the shiny debris as something bangs into them tilting

the raft, threatening to spill the creature into the water. She reaches out and grabs it by the scruff of the neck, pulling it to her aching chest.

More water chokes up from her insides and for a minute or so all she can do is cough and heave until the spasms pass. She manages to get up into a half-sitting position, braced better against the rocking of the chunk of whatever it is they are riding, doing her best to hold on to the animal.

She blinks again, holding one edge of the raft tight. Without her glasses everything beyond arm's length is a blur, and she looks down at the shivering dog in her other arm, taking in the sharp ears, the pointy muzzle, the thickly-matted fur of its tail.
